Our Austrian friends are from the French Lyceum of Vienna. This school welcomes nearly 1,800 students of 85 nationalities, from

school, which was opened on 16 January 1905 as the first music school in Bulgaria. In 1997, as a reward for its many years of excellence, this school was transformed into the National School of Music, named after a great Bulgarian composer Liubomir Pipkov.
